Much of the water drunk passes out of the body in the skin by means of the blood-vessels, and is known as unconscious perspiration. It is a well known fact that the loss of blood is always followed by intense thirst. This thirst is one of the most harrowing features of a battlefield, as every old soldier knows. The reason for it is that the blood-vessels being drained of their moisture, the skin becomes parched, and every pore is changed into a thirsty mouth. Thirst accompanies fevers, but its causes are local, being due to dryness in the throat and mouth, the result of a high temperature.—New York Advertiser.

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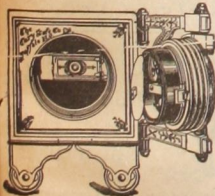
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
