SPRINGER AND KILGORE THE MEN.

President Cleveland Appoints the Illinoisan to the Northern District and the Texan to the Southern District of Indian Territory.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—The following appointments have been announced at the White House: William M. Springer, judge of the United States court of the northern district of the Indian Territory; Constantine Buckley Kilgore, judge of the United States court of the southern district of the Indian Territory.

Frightful Mine Disaster Occurs in Wyoming.

BRAVE MEN SEARCH FOR VICTIMS.

The First Two Bodies Brought Out Were So Burned and Blackened That It Was Almost Impossible to Identify Them.

SALT LAKE CITY, March 22.—A terrible explosion at Rocky Mountain No. 5, situated at Red Canyon, Wyo., has killed eighty men who are imprisoned in the mine, in addition to ten who were in the power house above ground or near the shaft openings.

Killed in the Power House. Elwin Cox, the outside carpenter, James Bruce, outside boss, and James G. Wall, power plant, are the three who were killed in the power house.

REV. DR. TALMAGE PREACHES UPON AN IMPORTANT SUBJECT.

Sturdy Blows in Behalf of the Home and Against the Dissoluteness of Modern Society—Wholesale Divorce Condemned. The Blessed Marriage State.

NEW YORK, March 17.—Rev. Dr. Talmage chose as the subject of his afternoon sermon in the Academy of Music today a topic of national interest—viz, "Wholesale Divorce." The great audience repeatedly showed its approval of the sentiments expressed by the reverend speaker, and his sturdy blows in behalf of the protection of the household and against the dissoluteness of modern society were received with marked appreciation.

That there are hundreds and thousands of infelicitous homes in America no one will doubt. If there were only one skeleton in the closet, that might be locked up and abandoned, but in many a home there is a skeleton in the hallway and a skeleton in all the apartments.

Our National Scourge. Some say that for the alleviation of all these domestic disorders of which we hear so much, a good prescription is to have God authorize marriage. I have just as much regard for one lawfully divorced as I have for one lawfully married.
