The signals of the Dwight and Normal interlocking switches have just been changed from the left side of the track to the right, and work on the interlockers north of Joliet will be performed next. Orders have been issued to have all these changes made by Feb. 1, so that the change to standard rules can be made at that time.

It is understood that the change to standard rules will be made then and that new cars for trains 51-52 between Chicago and Kansas City, will be put on and shortening up the time. The plans of the officials also include the addition of some new freights on the north end, possibly a new suburban train between Joliet and Chicago, and other changes now under discussion.

Freight Wreck.
About 1:30 Tuesday morning a north bound and a south bound freight collided opposite the hay press factory. The south bound freight pulled by engine 219 was on the main track and was waiting for No. 8. The north bound freight pulled by 308, one of the big engines, had only six cars of air and they were on the head end. She blew twice for brakes but the engineer on 308 claims he could not control the brakes and though the semaphore was against him, the train ran into 219 going however at a very slow rate of speed. The south bound engine was badly wrecked, and the north bound train telescoped at about the center, a refrigerator car of shudders and hams trips and barreled pork, being split open and badly smashed, the roof of it jammed it to the refrigerator car ahead and pushed in the entire end of it.
The rear end of the north bound freight was taken to Odell, and the wrecker had the tracks cleared by 1:00 Tuesday.
As the two engines collided the pilot of 308 struck pilot of 219 so as to turn it back under its own trucks, and jam it against the engine. The refrigerator car was ditched and burned, and 219 was taken to the shops. The wreck drew a big crowd from town. The damage done to 219 was lost pilot, and jammed tender to 308 lost pilot.

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School News.
The following is an extract from a paper read by Miss Alice Perry, on "The Relation of Individual to Class Instruction," read before the Odell Institute last week.
To promote a love for excellence, an appreciation of the good and true course to follow beings is to bring a mind into harmony with the three great attitudes of nature. In the first place it creates the desire for perfection, that ceaseless striving and aim which is the law of growth.
In developing the second, he finds an attractive power, which draws him toward art, science, a trade, or something that will in some way benefit him for I think when anything seems good or beautiful to us, it should be adopted or investigated, as it may be of special importance, a stepping stone that we require.
The laws of courtesy teach the pupil his relation to the world; it controls his passions and lessens selfishness. So if a teacher can start the development of these powers whether she be dealing with one pupil or with a class, there will be no question now about his growth.
At the present day it has been complained that pupils after leaving the high school show no inclination or aptitude for any one branch of study, they are not specialists. Now, to be a specialist is to be distinctly individualized along one or more certain paths of knowledge, and in some way people generally expect the high school or college in a few years to turn out a philosophical, a mathematical or an astronomical giant, no matter what education or direction of his earlier years has been.
But in a manner the accusation is true and perhaps far from evincing any decided preference for one art or industry, it is often lamentably deplored that they have not taken on or acquired the degrees of culture which the usual course of study in such an institution is supposed to imbue. The reason for this or the remedy for this I do not pretend to know. Hamerton says that the intellectual life is based upon personal investigation. This being true, when one investigates, he experiences. No one doubts that we learn by experience, but to bear fruit in the building of a man, it must be varied and a multiplied concurrence of investigations, which will make him the intuitive, perceptive being.
Then, seeing that mind growth is a slow progress, how expect a few years to perfect something in opposition to a natural sequence. In the words of a notable divine, "If thy innate faculties be rich, they will take a long time to unfold themselves."
In the last few years the increased attention given to nature studies in the lower grades cannot help in the near future the bearing of good results in the high school. This does not mean a burden to the grade teacher, as she may suit the subject to the time and inclination of her pupils. The modern kindergarten, which has established such a firm basis in the United States, is doing much toward the training and moulding of the future man and woman.
If all men are not born to be great, they have at least a distinct personality which each is bound to preserve, if he would survive. If the race would continue to its evolution from capability to realization, he is bound to acquire all the good which lies in his power.
To know is not to have memorized fact, but to have an absorbed or assimilated concept, out of which something analogous will proceed or develop. Thought is productive and knowledge is a tool in the hand of a master workman.
Dr. Mandley has it that the faculties acquired by one generation become the endowments of the next. And our own Lowell being asked upon one occasion when the education of a child should begin, replied, "A hundred years before it is born."
The world is always seeking a leader, for the one person who can ably command, ably direct, how many times has the fate of a whole people depended on the action of one man.
But we seek perfection; in morals to be good; in feelings to be sympathetic; in judgment, sound; in reasoning, logical; in imagination, constructive; the mind becoming fertile. Thus it is to have the power of thought. So I would say that in the relation of the individual to class instruction, the individual is paramount.
