Death of Librarian.

Evening Times, Pawtucket, R. I.—Fret J. Macartney, librarian at the Central Falls Public Library, died last night at the residence of his mother, 10 A-hy street.

Mr. Macartney was in his 22nd year and was born in Illinois. He came to Central Falls when a boy of about 5 or 7 years of age, and had resided here since that time. He was employed in the office of the New England Electrolytic Copper Company, and was one of the best known and most popular young men in the city.

For a number of years he was assistant librarian under Joseph W. Freeman, and when the latter retired from the office, Mr. Macartney was unanimously chosen by the trustees as his successor. With those who patronize the library he was ever a favorite because of his obliging and kindly disposition, and his death will cause a vacancy difficult to fill in this department.

Mr. Macartney was the son of Mrs. Nancy J. Macartney and the late Wm. Macartney. Former Alderman J. Currie Macartney was a brother of the deceased, and Freeman Macartney was another brother.

Mr. Macartney was ill a comparatively short time, and his death is said to have been caused by a complication of diseases, the primary cause of which was an abscess.

The arrangements for the funeral had not been completed this forenoon.

In accordance with the decision of the trustees, the library has been closed until Tuesday next as a mark of respect.

The old residents of Dwight and vicinity will remember the family as re-inhabitants of this community years ago.
