Obituary of Mrs. F. W. Ford.
Mollie J. Scott was born in Vandalia, Ill., September 22, 1848. She was always a great lover of books and was a fine student, and early determined to secure an education. Her parents died when she was quite young but she had courage and perseverance and graduated from the Vandalia school and also from the school at Irvingston. She devoted herself to teaching for several years and gained the reputation of being a very superior instructor of children, and was highly recommended by superintendents and patrons.
She often said that those years when she was hard at work in the school room were among the happiest years of her life.
She was married to Frank W. Ford at Vandalia, August 12, 1873, and came at once to Dwight which was her home during the remainder of her life. They had one son, Frank E., who is now abroad.
Mrs. Ford was an energetic, industrious and ambitious woman, who could never bear to be idle. She was an active member of the Ladies Benevolent Society of the Congregational church and always took a deep interest in its affairs. The last work she did for it was to secure names for a quilt which the ladies were making and collecting for the same.
For two or three years she was in poor health, and the doctors said the best thing she could do would be to go from home and so secure an entire change of air and diet. In accordance with this advice she went abroad with her son. They sailed from New York October 26, 1898, for Vienna, Austria, where the son went to study music.
The change was in every way beneficial to Mrs. Ford, for her health greatly improved at once, and she was better than she had been for years. Because of the advantage to her she remained longer than she otherwise would, but, however, she was expecting very soon to sail for home, when on March 4th, she was taken with a violent head-ache, which soon developed into severe heart trouble which terminated fatally March 8. Mrs. Krouse, a friend of hers in Vienna, wrote at once to Mr. Ford and gave him all of the particulars. She said that Mrs. Ford received the attention of as skilled physicians as could be found anywhere, either in America or England, and everything that could be done, was done. Her body was laid to rest in Central cemetery Vienna, Austria, and the English clergyman residing there attended the burial service.
It seems peculiarly sad that she should have died so far away from home and among strangers. But she

was an intelligent, kind hearted woman and made friends wherever she went, and was given every attention in her last sickness.
She leaves her husband, one son, and four brothers to mourn her loss. Her parents and one sister and two brothers had gone before.
Frank Ford will continue his musical studies under the old masters and expects to remain in Europe for an indefinite time.
Honors for Dwight.
Dwight C. Morgan, who has been in the service of the Chicago & Alton Railroad Company in various capacities since the new management of President Felton, has been promoted to the position of Engineer of Maintenance of way, from Kansas City to Roadhouse, including the branch from the main line at Mexico to Jefferson City, Missouri, in all more than 300 miles of the system. His headquarters will be at Kansas City.
Mr. Morgan is a native of this village, was graduated from the High School and completed a course in civil engineering at the University of Michigan in 1887, since which time he has been constantly engaged in the practice of his profession, almost exclusively in connection with the construction, maintenance and operation of railway. For over four years he was the consulting engineer of the state railroad commission.
As a citizen of Dwight, the people of the village, county and state have honored him in the management of public affairs and he has the confidence and esteem of all who know him.
We are informed that he will continue his home here for a time at least, which will be gratifying to the many friends of himself and family.
