

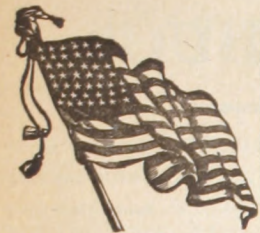

David Ross, formerly of LaSalle county, now a resident of Springfield, was nominated for congress by the republican convention of the seventeenth district at Taylorville last Saturday. The convention was controlled by Cullom's friends and the Cullom delegates from Sangamon county seated. Mr. Ross is well and favorably known in these parts and is particularly strong with the coal miners and laboring men. He is excellent on the stump and Congressman Caldwell will realize that he is up against the real thing.

LOOKS LIKE REEVES.

The Sreator Free Press, which speaks by the book according to the views of Mr. Reeves managers says that including all the county conventions held up to April 1, 671 delegates had been chosen to the state convention. Only about one third of this number had been instructed as to whom they should support for governor. Other delegates, however, had pledged themselves before, in and after the conventions and volunteered their promises of support. The most careful investigation shows with almost absolute certainty the standing of the candidates up to March.

Instructed and uninstructed delegates: Reeves, 387; Haney, 134; Yates, 122; Carter, 21; Brown, 7.

There yet remained to be chosen 861 delegates, and if only reasonable expectations are realized, Reeves will come so close to being nominated on the first ballot that possibly enough changes will come to him to give him the nomination, if not, the additional pledges of support on the second ballot will give him a handsome margin.
