

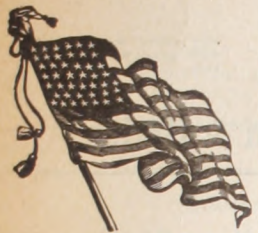

Republicans Meet.

The republican county central committee met in Pontiac Wednesday and all but three precincts were represented. The meeting was enthusiastic from start to finish and showed that republicanism is stronger than ever in Livingston county.

The date for the county convention to nominate county candidates and to select delegates to the congressional and senatorial conventions and to re-organize the county central committee, was set for Tuesday, May 29, and the primaries will be held Saturday, the 26th.

The candidates were all present and did a large amount of buttonholing, and all talked a little. Messrs. Ball, Miller, Mitchell, Londerbeck and Bladell all made a few remarks in which they told of their undying republicanism, how they sat at the table with the families of their constituency, played with the babies, and each one of course will be the nominee until after the convention and then they will be for the other fellow.

Circuit Clerk Hoobler was present and upon being called upon for a speech said that he was a candidate for nomination and that if they didn't bring out someone against him pretty soon they would have to nominate him. Hoobler has made an excellent record and it is only a deserving tribute to nominate him by acclamation.

Major M. R. Keeley was present and was called upon and made a few earnest remarks which showed him to be all that his friends represent him to be—an able, good, sound, sensible man, who would represent the district with credit to all. He said he was always a republican, believed in the grand principles of the party. He was a candidate in earnest and while until recently almost a stranger to many of the Livingston county people he was getting acquainted and wanted to meet everybody and if after an honest comparison with his competitor the people did not want him, he would be satisfied. He would not discuss the issues of the party until they had been more closely defined by the platforms, but was perfectly satisfied that the party would handle all political problems with the same ability and success in the future as in the past.

Senator Fort said he was a candidate for re-election, but gave no reason why Livingston county, which is larger than the other two, should again give away the highest representative office in the district. There is no doubt of the district being republican, Fort said, thus inferring that there was no doubt of the election of all the candidates. Fort has had the honor once through the liberality of Livingston county and the republicans will tell him emphatically the 29th that they want the senator once themselves, in the spirit of fairness.

Remarks were made by Rev. Eignus, of Forrest, who said he was for Fort because he wanted to be nominated himself. He then paid a deserving, earnest tribute to the republican party, and said he hoped to be sent back to Springfield.

Remarks were made by Major L. P. Straw, Dr. Sam Barnes and Captain Harry McDowell, and the meeting adjourned.

The campaign is now open in earnest and from this time on things will be lively in this county.
