PREPARE FOR MEMORIAL SUNDAY AND DECORATION DAY.

The Former Services to be Held in the Opera House.

Hon. John Daly, of Peoria, will Deliver the Address, Decoration Day.

As the day of all others which is celebrated by the patriotic people of Dwight approaches, complete arrangements are being made by the committees from the G. A. R., W. R. C. and S. of V., as follows:

At the recent meeting it was decided to have the decoration of graves by committees from the G. A. R., and S. of V., at 9 o'clock.

The procession will be formed promptly at 1 o'clock on Main avenue, under the direction of the marshalls, and march from Mazon to East street thence on Prairie Avenue to M. E. church and West on Mazon avenue to the beautiful shady West school grounds. The Dwight Cornet band will lead the procession. Besides the schools, G. A. R., and S. of V., the soldiers of 1898 have been requested to participate in the exercises.

The Mayor and city council will be asked to join the parade.

The exercises at the grounds will be selections by the schools, prayer by Rev. Bower, music by the band and Glee Club, address by Mr. Daly, music by the High School Glee Club.

The speaker is an excellent one. He is states attorney of the second county in the state, a splendid orator, and everyone should hear him.

The services Memorial Sunday will be held at the opera house at 10:30 a. m. and the societies will please meet at their halls at 10 a. m. sharp Sunday, May 27.

Death of Mrs. Ahern.

Joliet News, May 5:

"The death of Mrs. Margaret Ahern occurred at 2 o'clock Saturday morning at her residence, 206 North Eastern ave., after an illness of about a year, from heart disease.

Mrs. Ahern has been a resident of Joliet for a number of years and was highly esteemed by all who knew her for her many virtues and admirable qualities. An exceptionally devoted mother, she leaves a family of seven children to mourn her loss. Her favorite son, Stephen, an unusually attractive and promising young man employed at the penitentiary, died of the same trouble ten months ago. Five children were with her during her last illness: Mrs. Frank L. Smith, of Dwight, Helen Ahern, one of the teachers at Henderson school; Gertrude, a graduate of last years training class; Clinton and Archie.

The funeral services will be solemnized at St. Mary's church Monday morning at 8 o'clock. Interment will take place at Dwight, the old family home."
