

His Official Rights and the Questions He Will Ask.

This year the census enumerator will be loaded down with fewer instructions than were given to those who took the federal census of ten years ago...

Enumerators have a right to put every question contained in the census schedule and to obtain answers to all of them. Enumerators are cautioned not to obtrude needlessly on any person...

Enumerators are cautioned not to show their schedules or in any way give information bearing upon them. In canvassing a district enumerators have not the right to omit any dwelling...

On entering a house they are to transact their business in the quickest possible time and leave the premises. All the duties of the enumerators are to be performed under the direction and control of the supervisor of the district...

Do you own the house in which you live. 25. Do you rent the house in which you live? 26. If you own the house, is it free or mortgaged? (The same questions apply to farms.)

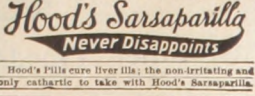
The double-headed excursion, Lockport to Peoria, passed through Dwight Sunday night and judging from the echoes from the cars it must have been a very enjoyable excursion.

THE NEWS IN BRIEF.

For the Week Ending May 31.

The British parliament has adjourned until June 14.

Fire destroyed a large portion of the town of Plocha, Va.

Alabama populists have nominated Samuel M. Adams for governor.

The Boer envoys left Washington on a trip to several large cities.

Near Montgomery, W. Va., 12 men died from eating poisoned provisions.

A senate committee has begun investigation of the postal frauds in Cuba.

Fire at Jamestown, Pa., destroyed 12 buildings, including the post office.

Queen Victoria's eighty-first birthday was celebrated throughout the British empire.

Cholera is spreading rapidly in India, killing hundreds of famine-stricken natives.

Admiral Schley's fleet will remain in South American waters for the next six months.

The discovery of gold in the Mojave desert, California, has started a rush in that direction.

The Illinois social labor party has nominated L. Hoffman, of Jacksonville, for governor.

Robert P. Burt, the oldest locomotive engineer in America, died in Beloit, Wis., aged 90 years.

Samuel Cupples and Robert Brookings, of St. Louis, donated \$5,000,000 to Washington university.

Auditors investigating the Cuban treasury and customs department found no trace of fraud.

Chinese "boxers" were said to be marching toward Peking and burning railway bridges en route.

Burglars blew open the safe of the Clarke Exchange bank at Sturgeon, Mo., secured \$3,000 and escaped.

Diamond Jubilee, the prince of Wales' coat, won the Epsom Derby in the presence of 20,000 spectators.

Gen. Jose M. Hernandez, the revolutionary leader in Venezuela, has been captured by government troops.

The Russian minister at Peking has telegraphed asking that all the available gunboats be sent to Taku.

Albert Francis Judt, chief justice of the supreme court of Hawaii, died at his residence in Nuuanu Valley.

Fire partially destroyed the paper mills of the York Haven Paper company at York Haven, Pa. Loss, \$100,000.

A cyclone struck the western part of Sebewa township, Mich., and did great damage to farm property.

Democratic republicans will hold their state convention in Grand Rapids June 27 to nominate state officers.

Sheriff Tyler, of Grand county, Utah, and Susan Jenkins, a cattle owner, were killed by a band of outlaws.

The entire town of Frugalita, Pa., with its coal and coke interests, has been sold to a company of capitalists.

Judge John P. Rea, commander in chief of the G. A. R. in 1877-88, died at his home in Minneapolis, aged 60 years.

The forty-fourth anniversary of the first republican state convention held in Illinois was celebrated in Bloomington.

Rev. Dr. John Scudder, of the Dutch Reformed church's Arot mission in India, died at Kodaikanal, aged 64 years.

Ohio prohibitionists nominated a state ticket headed by J. K. Montgomery, of Greene county, for secretary of state.

The last day was one of the most interesting of the ten days' sessions of the Baptist anniversary in Detroit, Mich.

Rev. Dr. Richard Lee, the oldest Presbyterian minister in Pennsylvania, died at his home in New Alexandria, aged 90 years.

Harry E. Miles, 25 years old, was killed and William E. Starford was fatally injured in a bicycle race at Waltham, Mass.

David W. C. Johnson, a capitalist, lumberman and owner of a fortune of upward of \$25,000,000, died at his home in Pontiac, Mich.

Fire destroyed the Home of the Good Shepherd at Peoria, Ill. The sisters in charge and the inmates had narrow escapes.

The English Naval Annual says by the end of the year the English navy will me than equal France and Germany combined.

Japan is so enraged by the encroachment of Russia in the east that diplomats at St. Petersburg regard war as a probability.

Louisa Chamberlain, a wealthy Boston widow, 76 years old, died last week. Her husband W. A. Hutchinson, an actor, aged 74.

While William Hettzell and George Detchen were trying to steal a cow from an abandoned well at Alliance, O., they were suffocated by gas.

The director of posts of the Philippine islands reports that the expenses paid there will be a profit of over \$15,000 in the 11 months from May 1, 1899.

Subscriptions are being received for a monument in Erie, Pa., to Capt. Charles V. Gridley, commander of the flagship Olympia in Dewey's fleet at Manila.

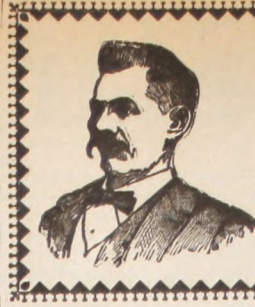
