**Obituary.**

C. M. Luther was born in Adison, Vt., July 5, 1822, and died from a complication of diseases at the home of his son W. H. Luther, at 11 a. m. Sunday, May 27, 1900. He was united in marriage to Miss Anna Hitchens, of Racine, Wis., Oct. 4, 1850, and five children were born to them. One daughter died two years ago and four sons who are living, two in Kansas, one in Colorado and one here.

Mr. Luther grew to manhood in Vermont, but in early life went to Wisconsin for a short time. He came to this state in 1852, and subsequently bought a farm near Cabery and lived there for many years, but finally sold his place five or six year ago. Since then he has spent the larger portion of his time in Dwight, but has also been occasionally with his sons in Colorado and Kansas.

Mr. Luther was an honored member of the Masonic Lodge at Cabery and took a great deal of interest in the order.

He was of sterling integrity and was the soul of honor. His word was as good as his bond. The funeral was held at the residence of his son, W. H. Luther, at 2 p. m. Tuesday, the Rev. E. F. Wright, officiated. Some of his Cabery friends and members of the Masonic fraternity were in attendance.

The body was laid to rest in Oak Lawn cemetery.
