Pontiac.

R. F. Bradford attended the meeting of the state central committee in Chicago, and was assigned a place on the committee on organization.

The F. T. & O. says votes were bought at the republican primaries, and admits that some of them were democrats. Is that possible?

The question is often asked: "Did Shankland and Truitt sell everything to be chairman of the county and senatorial conventions respectfully." It looks like it and they are pretty "cheap skates."

The Democratic county central committee met last week and called the county convention to meet at Pontiac Tuesday, June 19. The caucuses will be held at 2 p. m. the 9th of June. It was also ordered that three central committeemen be chosen from each precinct, and that the new county central committee meet at Pontiac at 10 a. m. June 19. The basis of representation is one delegate for every twenty votes of fraction of eleven cast for Bryan, which makes a convention 203. Dwight has five in the first precinct and seven in the second, Round Grove six, Broughton, six, Union five, Nevada seven, Odell eight, Sunbury seven. If Ed. Johnson has things as well in hand as he had the last one, the delegates might as well send their proxies to him and let him run it.

There are quite a number of good republicans spoken of for chairman of the county central committee, among whom are Ed. Reed, J. M. Lyon, R. Hoobler, of Pontiac; Fisk, of Eppards Point; Lish, of Sagemont; Smith, of Dwight; Gregg, of Fairbury, and others any of whom would fill the bill.
