Chas. Young and Cliff Merrill were in Kempton last Friday evening.

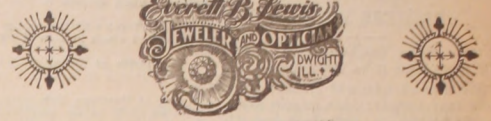
