A good way to test a swindling scheme is to offer a non-negotiable note when the time comes for signing. Flag Station.

The more improvements made on the C. & A. the less accommodations there are for Dwight people, and when the trains are all palace cars probably the authorities will allow the people to walk on the tracks to get out of town.

There is no way to get north from Dwight now from 2:15 p. m. to 4:15 a. m. No. 1 goes through at 5:48 p. m., and the authorities should be particular about the speed that all other trains make inside the limits.
