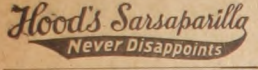

INSURGENT LEADER QUITS

Gen. Macabulos, the Last Filipino Commander in Larlac, Lays Down His Arms.

HIS OFFICERS AND MEN FOLLOW SUIT.

Troops Under Gen. Funston Have a Sharp Fight—Result of a Scouting Campaign for a Week—The Civil Commission Preparing for Legislative Powers.

Washington, June 16.—An important capture of Filipino insurgents was reported to the war department Friday morning by Gen. MacArthur in the following cable message:

"Manila, June 15.—Gen. Macabulos, with eight officers, enlisted men, and 124 rifles, surrendered to Col. E. H. Liscum, of the Ninth Infantry, at Larlac this morning. Macabulos is the most important and last insurgent leader in Larlac and Pangasinan."

"MACARTHUR."

Manila, June 16.—Upon information furnished by Maj. Wheeler to the effect that Gen. Lacuna intended to attack Papaya, province of Nueva Ecija, Gen. Funston, with staff officers, Capt. Koehler and troop G, of the Fourth Cavalry, and half a company of the Thirty-fourth Infantry, repaired to Papaya. Gen. Lacuna was found with 200 men occupying a position on a ridge two miles south of the town. Gen. Funston attacked him vigorously, 60 Americans charging the enemy under a hot fire. The insurgents fled. On their attempt to make a stand later, Capt. Koehler, with a detachment of troops, charged and scattered them. The pursuit over the rough country lasted until nightfall. Twenty-two of the insurgents were killed. One American was killed and one wounded.

A Week's Scouting.

Manila, June 18.—The United States forces had two engagements of importance last week. The troops under Gen. Funston and Gen. Grant organized an advance, with parts of five regiments and two companies against 500 rebels in a mountain stronghold east of Biacabata, where it was supposed Capt. Roberts, of the Thirty-fifth Regiment, who was captured last month at San Miguel de Mayumo, was held captive. The Americans operated under many difficulties and over an exceedingly rough country, but the rebels retreated, only a few resisting, and the stronghold was occupied and burned. As the result of last week's scouting 60 Filipinos were killed, 200 were captured, and 300 rifles, with 23,000 rounds of ammunition were surrendered. Three Americans were killed.

The Civil Commission.

Manila, June 18.—Judge Taft and his colleagues of the civil commission are studying the different legislative phases of the situation preparatory to the work of enacting new laws on September 1, when they assume legislative power. The commissioners have established offices in the same building with Gen. MacArthur and are receiving, discussing and absorbing the opinions of army and navy men and of foreigners and Filipinos.

BLOOMINGTON'S CALAMITY.

Courthouse and the Finest of Her Business Houses Burned with Loss of Over a Million.

Bloomington, Ill., June 20.—A terrific conflagration has wiped out nearly one-half of the business portion of Bloomington, including the finest business buildings and heaviest stocks of merchandise. Two sides of the courthouse square are in ruins, the north and east, and two other blocks cornering on the square and one-half of the block west of the square are destroyed. The courthouse is a ruin. It is standing, but is gutted from dome to basement. The loss is variously estimated at from \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000. Fortunately no lives were lost or anyone seriously injured.

Destroyed by Fire.

Des Moines, Ia., June 18.—Sunday morning at four o'clock the large auditorium used for convention hall and only constructed a year ago, at a cost of \$50,000, was destroyed by fire. The insurance amounts to \$25,000. It was occupied by the commercial exchange and the T. W. P. Chase Amusement company. At the latter holding a loan and conducting a vaudeville show. All seats, effects and scenery were lost, amounting to \$5,000, making the total loss, as now estimated, \$40,000.

Kills a Pugilist.

New York, June 18.—Patrolman Irwin E. Corchilus, of the Brooklyn force, shot and killed Patrick Farley, a pugilist, early in the day. Farley had been arrested by the officer for wife beating, and was trying to escape when he met his death wound.

Three Men Killed.

Philadelphia, June 18.—Three men were killed and 14 persons were injured, none fatally, Sunday by an explosion of gun powder and dynamite used in the manufacture of fireworks.

Want Books.

Washington, June 21.—The Woman's Army and Navy league has issued an appeal for aid for the library at Manila, P. I., established as a memorial to the heroes of the war.

Lost at Sea.

Port Philip, B. C., June 16.—The British ship Sierra Nevada was wrecked near here and 23 of the crew, including Capt. Scott, were drowned.

In Good Condition.

Washington, June 20.—Gen. Wood reports that expert accountants have examined the treasurer's office in Havana and found it in good condition.

MRS. GLADSTONE DEAD.

Widow of the Famous English Statesman Passes Away at Haverwarden.

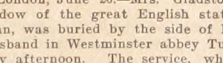
London, June 15.—Mrs. Gladstone, widow of William E. Gladstone, the English statesman, died at 5:40 p. m. Thursday.

For 60 years Mrs. Gladstone was the faithful helpmeet of England's "grand old man." William Ewart Gladstone, who she married in 1839, when she was Catherine Glynne, daughter of Sir Stephen Glynne, of Haverwarden.

She was in her eighty-eighth year. In her way she has been as remarkable as her husband, aiding him in his political career by her tact, capabilities for leadership and keen instincts.

She has long been loved for her Christian character and many benevolences, among them an industrial school for boys and a home for incurably diseased orphans. Mrs. Gladstone was the mother of eight children, two daughters and six sons. One son is governor of the Bank of England—Samuel—and another, Sir Stephen, is a clergyman of the Church of England. It is said of Mrs. Gladstone that she was noted for earnestness in dress and idolatry of her famous husband.

London, June 20.—Mrs. Gladstone, widow of the great English statesman, was buried by the side of her husband in Westminster abbey Tuesday afternoon. The service, which was impressive, closely resembled that of her husband. While it was attempted to keep the services as private as possible, some hundreds of friends attended.



TO WAGE A BITTER WAR.

Organized Labor to Espouse St. Louis Strikers' Cause—Long Struggle Promised.

St. Louis, Mo., June 18.—The long-drawn out controversy between the St. Louis Transit company and its striking employes has now simmered down into a struggle between capital and labor along the lines of a boycott. The submitting of the question of the reinstatement of the former employes of the company to arbitration has been the bone of contention in the recent negotiations for a settlement of the strike. But, like all former contentions, it has resulted in nothing, the railway officials demanding an unconditional surrender on the part of the men.

As a result of the company's action President Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, has declared that he will do all in his power to bring the influence of the whole body of organized labor in America to bear upon the local situation in an effort to win the strike for the union. Mr. Gompers urges the strikers to make the operation of the cars as expensive as possible by refusing to procure them. The boycott to be declared, strike leaders say, will apply not only to the St. Louis Transit company, but to every person, every business man, every association, and, in fact, any corporation or individual favoring it in any way.

Murderer Hanged.

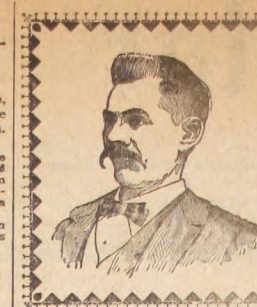
