Railroad News.
Two firemen on the Alton were overcome by heat the Fourth.
A rate of one cent a mile has been granted by the Western Passenger Association to members of the Grand Army who desire to attend the National encampment at Chicago this year.
One of the longest trains ever seen in Kankakee passed through there on the Big Four the other day. It consisted of 95 empty cars, and was pulled by one engine. One of the 3-1 trainmen says "it was the longest train that ever came down the pike."

With its rapid growth from the little line that reached from Stretor to Knox, it has spread out to South Bend, then to St. Joe, Michigan, and with the opening of its last extension it will enter its fourth state at Clinton, Iowa, and is certainly deserving of a more expansive name than even the 3-1, and it is proposed that it be re-christened the Interstate Line Company—Stretor Free Press.
