ILLINOIS STATE NEWS.

Public Charities. The quarterly bulletin of the state board of public charities for June 30 shows a total income for the 15 state charitable institutions of \$760,119, a total expense incurred of \$512,360.

Rescued from Gypsies. After two years in the captivity of a band of gypsies, a life which was a living death, Elmer Morgan, aged 12 years, was rescued ten miles north of Belleville.

Crop Outlook. The weekly bulletin of the Illinois section of the climate and crop service of the weather bureau says:

The last week has been excellent for harvesting purposes. Good rains have fallen in the northern district and parts of the central district, but they have not materially interfered with farm work.

Shot and Killed.

In a fight near Divide, ten miles north of Mount Vernon, Andrew Sarger shot and killed Samuel Reed and seriously wounded Mrs. Reed.

Chinese Laundry Wrecked.

Enraged at the news from China, a mob attacked a Chinese laundry at Virden and the entire front of the building was demolished with clubs, bricks and other missiles.

Swims to Liberty.

James Buckingham shot and killed Charles Mosely in Centerville as a result of a quarrel over a game of cards.

Told in a Few Lines.

Swan Jacobson, a well-to-do farmer living near Princeton, took his own life by hanging.

Fire destroyed the electric light plant, J. A. Torquist's carriage factory and Scott's hardware store at Altona. The total loss was \$15,000.

Rural free delivery service has been established at Rockford and Roscoe. The Joliet street works, shut down for several weeks, have resumed, 203 men being put to work.

Citizens of Quincy believe the census will show the city to be third in population in Illinois.

The business portion of Altoona was seriously damaged by fire to the extent of \$15,000.

Mrs. George Godfrey, an elderly woman, the wife of a prominent and well-to-do business man of Geneseo, committed suicide by hanging herself.

The democrats of the Eleventh district have nominated E. A. Holly for congress.

Policemen Sheehan and Mosher were discharged from the Chicago force for highway robbery.

Sheriffs and chiefs of police in Illinois have decided to form an association to check crime.

Because of an advance in the price of beer by the barrel, hundreds of Chicago saloons will close, cutting the city's revenue \$1,000,000 a year.

James Nicol, first vice president of the Chicago board of trade, was suspended for "false and fictitious trades."

Frank Groke, of Chicago, and John Fitzgerald, of Dyersville, Ia., were killed and seven others slightly injured by lightning during a storm near Winthrop.

The farm owned by the Locomotive Engineers' union near Mattoon has been sold, the project of raising a home for disabled members being given up.

Hon. M. R. Peckenbaugh, city treasurer of Pittsfield, and a prominent politician and society man, dropped dead while sitting in a chair in front of a grocery.

Mrs. Jane McElvain, who lived four miles west of Bushnell, is dead. She was the oldest woman in McDonough county, being 89 years and two months old.
