CHAPTER NO. 103.

Ordinance of the Village of Dwight, Illinois. Annual Appropriation bill for the year ending 1901.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the President and members of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Dwight, Livingston County and State of Illinois, that for all expenses and liabilities of said Village, ending April 1901, there be and is hereby appropriated the sum of Seventeen Thousand, Eighty Dollars (\$17,080 00), in detail for the following purposes, viz:
