MR. CHARLES UPHAM, Friend Charles as the old saying is "Ill news travels fast" so I guess I will not break the saying. It is with regret that I pencil these lines to you to inform you that today at 3 o'clock we laid to rest the earthly remains of your friend, (ours) though I had only known him since he came to the army, Howard McCall. He had been sick for some time with the chills, fever and general debility such as we all have just at present. We buried him on a hill just outside this town, as it was too low inside the town to dig a grave. We made a very neat coffin and all in all he was laid to rest better than any I have seen in these islands. His firing squad were all men from old A. Co. 23, Infantry. Everything was very nice considering our surrounding. There are only two companies here, C and D.

We are enjoying a much needed rest as we have done some of the hardest hiking of any troops in the islands. We hiked a man from Maj. (3rd at that) to a Col. We have also seen some pretty hard scraps, through our loss has been very small. Do you remember Salmon Miller? He was killed some time ago. He and McCall are the only two who are buried here from our old outfit. I suppose you have heard from some of the other boys since they re-enlisted so I will not bore you with a long letter. We are all doing very well at present, the most of the boys are non-coms. I HAVE BEEN. DWIGHT (R. & S.) A WINNER.

Win Two Out of Three Games at Kankakee.

The first contest of the tournament season occurred at Kankakee Saturday, the 4th and Dwight, Kankakee and Cardiff were the contesting nines. The following was the result of contest by score: Dwight vs. Kankakee 11 to 1, Cardiff vs. Kankakee 17 to 4, and Dwight vs. Cardiff 4 to 3, which gives Dwight two out of three games and thereby gives her the right to hold the championship banner until the next game at Cardiff Saturday, the 11th, today, when, if she is fortunate and plays with usual proficiency, she may still retain it. The three games at Kankakee were played in the afternoon and there was a good crowd of spectators.

In the decisive game of the day Dwight vs. Cardiff, Keeley, the Dwight pitcher, fanned out the batters readily. The game was close and exciting, and was a tie up to the eighth inning. Tinsman, whose batting was the feature of the game, drove out a double in the ninth inning and brought in two men.

The day was very hot and the boys were given a severe test.

The Cardiff pitcher was Carl Reinmiller.

The tournament which opened Saturday last will run August 11 and 18, the game which finally decides the possession of the championship banner will according to present arrangements be played at Dwight, and it is hoped that on that day it will not leave our city.

Only amateurs are playing ball in this contest, and the tournament will show the local merits of the nines.

NOTES.

Col. Smith played a fine game on second, accepting nine chances without error. His stick work was more than the average.

Reel caught Keeley fourteen innings without a passed ball.

Kankakee as the score of 11 to 1 shows is outclassed by Dwight.

Dwight bids fair to excel last year. She won 10 out of 12 games then, but she is likely to excel even that record.

Reed on first made veteran plays in the Dwight-Cardiff game.

The championship banner has been on exhibition in Beltzhoover's drugstore. It is a handsome affair.

Cornell vs. Odell.

One of the hottest contested games of the season occurred on the Cornell grounds Thursday afternoon, August 2, between the Cornell Browns and the Odell team, resulting in a doubtful tie at the end of the ninth inning and what the Cornell team called a score of 9 to 8 in their favor, at the conclusion of the eleventh inning. At the beginning of the ninth inning the score stood 7 to 7. The Odell boys making one run during the ninth, making the score 8 to 7 with Cornell at the bat. They got one man on first base but in running second was put out, but as that put the side out and beat them they raised a howl declaring the man safe. The umpire called the man out and stuck to it, but the captain of the Odell team rather than have any trouble allowed the game to go on. The base runner admitted after the game was over that he was out. The game continued until the eleventh inning when Cornell made another run making the score 9 to 8.

Barring the disputed run in the ninth, the Cornell Browns did not make a run in eight innings. We don't mind their running one or two professionals into the game on us, but hope that they will not pick up more than four or five when they play a return game here Thursday. GRAND EXCURSION.

The train will be composed of fine day cars and a baggage car in which lunch baskets will be taken care of if properly labeled.

The stay at these summer resorts will be not less than six hours and probably seven, and those who desire can come back the next morning.

This is the first cheap excursion to these handsome places on a week day and undoubtedly will be taken advantage of by several hundred people.

AMUSEMENTS AT ST. JOE.

The park extends along the lake on the bluffs and is shady and comfortably seated. There are bath houses where suits can be procured for bathing, boat houses and a band concert is given nearly every afternoon, and there is a dancing pavilion. Lunch can be secured and meals at all prices. From the park is a beautiful view of the lake.

Pleasure lake steamers leave the docks at 3 p. m. every afternoon for an hours cruise, all for 10 cents. Pleasure river steamers go up the river through the fruit country for several miles for 25 cents.

Electric cars run to Benton Harbor or to the Springs, 10 cents round trip.

There are all classes of hotels and all prices for accommodations. There is about everything needed to put in a fine days pleasure.

The Chicago & Alton have commenced grading for a new side track 4,000 feet long just south of town. It is the intention to put in another track of about the same length just west on the branch. This will relieve the congestion of trains from the center of town and remove much of the switching and train work which is now so annoying. It is also the intention to remove the stock pens from their present location to the outskirts.
