

MOB RULES AN OHIO CITY

Angry Citizens of Akron Fight with Sheriff's Posse in Effort to Lynch a Negro.

TWO PERSONS DEAD AND OTHERS HURT.

Falling to Secure the Prisoner the Crowds Loot Gun Shops and Set Fire to Buildings—Use Dynamite on the Prison—Gov. Nash Sends Troops to Aid Officials.

Akron, O., Aug. 23.—A mob of several thousand frenzied persons, infuriated over an assault upon the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Maas by Louis Peck, a colored man, searched the city prison Wednesday night for the negro, engaged in a battle of bullets with the officers of the law, killed two persons and wounded many more, set fire to Columbia hall and the city building, destroying both, using dynamite on the latter. Shortly after midnight the mob broke into a hardware store and stole all the ammunition and firearms in the place, including guns, rifles and revolvers, proceeded to the city building and opened fire on the defenders, at the same time applying the torch to Columbia hall. The flames spread rapidly and efforts of the fire department to stop the impending conflagration were resisted by the rioters.

Search the Jail.
Peck was arrested Wednesday and murmurs of gathering trouble caused the sheriff secretly to transfer the prisoner to Cleveland. The report that he had been freed soon after dark. Not believing the statement of the sheriff that Peck had been spirited out of the city the crowd sent committees through the city prison and the county jail to search for the negro.

This proving fruitless the mob gathered in front of the city jail, threatening its destruction unless Peck be produced. Lynching was on the tongue of everyone in the crowd, and even the rope had been provided and was dangling from the arm of a citizen.
Mayor W. E. Young hastened to the building and mounting the steps called upon the crowd to disperse, pledging his word that the prisoner had been escorted out of town.
Attack on City Prison.
At ten o'clock the mob began to attack the city prison for the third time. In the excitement someone fired a shot, which was followed by a fusillade. The officers in the building appeared at the windows and began to shoot over the heads of the people. A man armed with a shotgun leveled his weapon at the officers and they were soon made the target for the mob's fire.
An indescribable scene followed. Several of the policemen fell wounded, others were struck by bricks and other missiles hurled by the mob, and the return fire of the law's officers wrought havoc in the ranks of the mob.

The Victims.
Two people are dead, three fatally wounded and several others badly hurt.
Davidson, four-year-old child of John M. Davidson, shot dead while sitting in a baby carriage.
Glenn Wade, ten years old; shot through the heart.
The fatally wounded:
Fireman, name unknown; shot in the body, will die.
Alonzo Manchester, fireman, shot in the neck, will die.
Fred V. Orwick, 25 years old, of 43 North street; hit by a charge of buckshot, dying at the hospital.
Arthur E. Sprague, shot in the head; cannot live.
Fly for Their Lives.
All the officers who have been penned up in the city building for two hours escaped through a rear window and ran for their lives. The mob is yet firing on the city building and the militia has been called for. One fireman whose name cannot be learned was shot and he probably will die. As fast as lines of hose are stretched they are cut.

Troops Called Out.
Columbus, O., Aug. 23.—Gov. Nash has received a telegram from the sheriff of Summit county asking for militia to quell the riot at Akron. The famous Fourth regiment will be sent to the scene of the trouble.
Horne to the Tomb.
Atchison, Kan., Aug. 20.—Funeral services over the body of ex-Senator John J. Ingalls were held yesterday afternoon at Trinity Episcopal church, and subsequently interment was made in the family vault in Mount Vernon cemetery. Owing to the request of the family for privacy a request made in accordance with the expressed wishes of Mr. Ingalls, there was no great throng at the services.
Treaty with Spain.
Washington, Aug. 22.—Minister Storer, at Madrid, informs the state department that a treaty of amity, commerce and navigation and generally intercourse has been signed provisionally by the minister of state and himself. This practically marks the last step in the complete restoration of relations between Spain and the United States.
Nominate Dewey.
Britt, Ia., Aug. 23.—The tourists' union, an organization of tramps, met here and nominated Admiral George Dewey and "Filipino Joe" Bazill, of Minnesota, for president and vice president of the United States.
The Forty-fourth Victim.
Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 23.—Mrs. A. Swanson, a victim of the Fourth of July street car accident, died Tuesday from the result of her injuries. This makes 44 deaths as the result of the wreck.
