Chas. Robinson and G. Gorbett drove to Cabery last week Thursday.

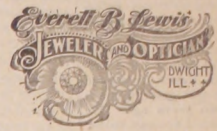
Boss Thos. Drew and Miss Ina Nickerson drove to Cullom Saturday.
