Death of Jesse Watkins.

Jesse Watkins, of Bloomington, Ill., age thirty years, employed as a fireman on the C. & A. R. R. died on Sunday at noon last, from injuries received by being struck by train No. 3, of the C. & A. on Sunday at 5:30 a. m. He was at once placed on a stretcher and taken to the C. & A. depot and Dr. C. H. Barr was called and, with many of his friends done all they could to relieve his sufferings. His brother Arthur and a near friend, Mr. Joseph Templeton, of Bloomington, were at once notified and came on the first train but he was unable to recognize them. His uncle from Bloomington and brother, J. W. Watkins, from Chicago, arrived on the afternoon train. His remains were prepared by C. M. Baker and taken to Bloomington for burial, the funeral stopping for them Sunday evening.

Jesse Watkins was quite well known in Dwight, having been employed several years ago in a bank with his uncle J. W. He was married a few years ago and at the time of the accident his wife was visiting in Canada.

No one seems to know just how the deceased met with the accident, but he was working under his engine and is supposed to have got out from under it backwards, not supposing he was so near the other track, and was struck in the back with such force as to cause internal injuries from which no one could recover.

The deceased was well liked by his many Dwight friends and much sympathy was expressed by all.
