Livingston County Teachers' Meeting.

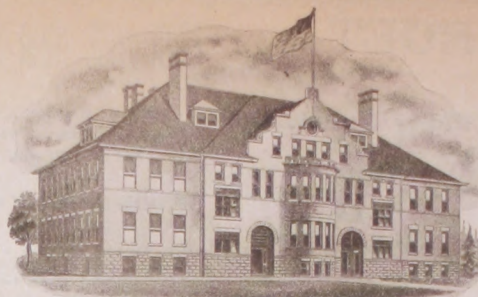
Conferences of Livingston County Teachers will be held as follows:

Dwight, Saturday, October 6.
Ancona, Saturday, October, 13.
Saanemin, Saturday, October, 20.
Pontiac, Saturday, October, 27.
Chatsworth, Saturday, November, 3.

The following topics are suggested for discussion at these meetings:

1. "What are the difficulties met with in teaching Hall's Arithmetics?"
2. "The daily preparation of the teacher with special reference to our new text-books."
3. "What obstacles do we find in teaching Fry's Geographies?"
4. "Does our County Course provide for too much or too little work?"
5. "To what extent are we following the alteration of work outlined in the County Course?"
6. "Music work for the present year. What are we doing? How are we doing it?"
7. "What are we doing in Drawing? How handle the drawing work this year?"
8. "The helps we most need."
9. "School decorations."
10. "The visitation of schools."

There will be two sessions at the school house in each at 10 A. M. and 1:30 P. M. respectively. Probably these conferences will be the only educational meetings held until the latter part of January and it is hoped that every teacher will plan to attend at least one of them. All are urged to come prepared to discuss any of the topics suggested, and it is especially desired that teachers be prepared to write brief answers to the topics given in question form.
