**IRELAND FOR MCKINLEY.**

Archbishop will Hurry Home to Lead Republicans his Support.

Archbishop Ireland of St. Paul, in an interview yesterday announced his intention of voting for McKinley.

The great American prelate has just arrived in London from Paris. He went at once to his apartments at the Grand hotel. After asking with interest for the latest reliable political news, his grace declared that he was hurrying home in order to lend the moral effect of his vote and support to the republican cause.

"I am glad," he continued, "on the eve of my return to the United States, to contradict the statement that I have wavered in my adherence to republican principles. I am a republican and intend to remain one. There is more than ordinary need of party loyalty this year. The administration upon which the country is asked to pass judgement has been and is now confronted with problems of democratic and foreign policy which to a certain degree put Americanism on trial before the world.

"These problems, I believe, the administration has handled with sagacity, statesmanship, patriotism and in a manner which deserves the approval of the American people. The unrivaled progress of the United States is the wonder of the nations in these closing days of an eventful century. I am for the party and the policy which has done so much to justify the estimation in which our country is held abroad."
