FATAL ACCIDENT.

Michael O'Leary Dies from Injuries Received by an Engine.

Odell Outlook.

Michael O'Leary died at his home in Odell at about 9 o'clock Saturday evening. His death was the result of injuries received shortly after 8 o'clock while on the railroad crossing north of the depot, he was found under engine No. 314 by the engineer, with both legs crushed. Doctors were soon in attendance, but he lived only a short time.

Just how the accident occurred is still a mystery. Passenger train No. 65 going north due at 7:55 p. m. was a few minutes late, as the train stopped at the depot, a freight train going south at almost the same time arrived, but as the engineer thought that the headlight of the engine on the other track belonged to the local freight, he simply slackened his speed and did not notice the difference until almost opposite the other engine, when he applied the air and stopped the train. Getting down off of the engine and going forward the engineer found Mr. O'Leary. He lived only a short time after being moved to his home.

The funeral services were held in St. Paul's church conducted by Father Griffin, at 10 o'clock Monday morning. The remains were laid to rest in the cemetery north of town.

Michael O'Leary was born in Limerick, County Cork, Ireland, in 1841 and came to this country in 1861. He lived in New York a short time before removing to Chicago where he married Miss Anna Earkin, Oct. 5, 1873. Mr. and Mrs. O'Leary came to Odell in the fall of 1874, which has since been their home the greater part of the time. They were the parents of three boys, two, John F. and Wm. H. who with their mother survive the deceased.

Died, Oct. 13, at Davenport, Iowa, Richard Dunlop Bard, aged 82 years. Mr. Bard was the fosterfather and uncle of Mrs. Moore, also the cousin of Archie and Joseph Dunlop, who resided in Dwight for many years. His daughter Fannie is the wife of John Dunlop, of Chicago. He suffered for many years with consumption, a hereditary disease of the family. He was one of God's good men and nothing further could possibly be added to convey the idea that all the requisites of the true life of a man had been lived.
