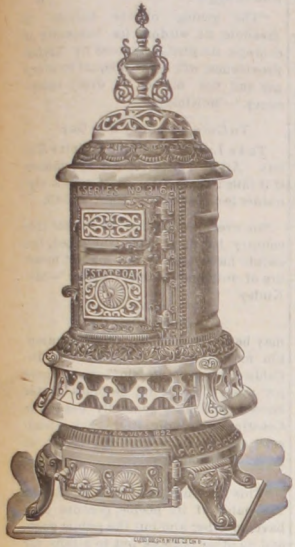

Pontiac.

The grand round-up is this week, and your correspondent predicts a plurality in Livingston County in the neighborhood of 2,000.

Saturday, "Dick Yates, the next governor of Illinois, was here for a few minutes and spoke to fully 4,000 people in the court house square, and received a fine reception.

Gen'l Kennedy did not arrive but got lost somewhere. Representative Eignua spoke in the afternoon and Alexander Revell, of Chicago, delivered a splendid, business talk in the evening.

There has not been much betting here on account of Bryan money being scarce. Offers have been made by republicans in New York, Indiana, big odds on Illinois, that Bryan won't receive as many electoral votes as in 1896, and that Bryan won't carry a northern state, but no takers, unless unreasonable odds are asked.

The county republican rally was an immense affair there being about 1,500 marchers in line and fully 8,000 people in town. There were big delegations from Streator, Fairbury, Forrest, Odell, Dwight, Cornell, Chenoa, Chatsworth, Flanagan and other places. There were five fine bands present and music was plenty. The route of march was a long one but all stayed in. The Dwight club attracted considerable attention, especially the ladies, who marched about thirty strong, and carried flags. The Pontiac Leader had the following to say of Dwight: "The Dwight Ladies marching club was one of the most complimented features of the parade." "The drilled clubs of Dwight and Cornell pleased everybody by their fancy movements and fine marching." There was never such a demonstration in Livingston County and clearly shows what the sentiment is.
