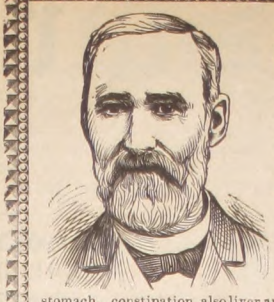


ADDITIONAL LOCAL.
