They say, "It has ripened." It is the preservative or, rather, the unchanging quality of honey that makes it so popular with the best confectioners.—Christian Herald.

Dances in Sardinia. Sardinian dancing is unlike any other. It is a kind of shuffling with the feet as the dancers, holding hands, move to and fro, the women on one side of the dancing ground and the men on the other, till they have worked round to the opposite sides, while the las launeddas is played by a man who walks up and down between the dancers. As a rule, the men and women do not mix, whether dancing or not, but keep each to their own side. The dances take place on Sundays or feast days in some plaza of the village, but hardly ever in the big town.

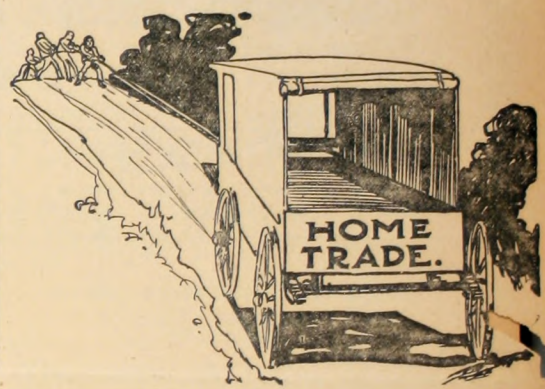
Women Duelists. A celebrated duel took place in 1808 between Countess de Polignac and Mme. de Neale.
