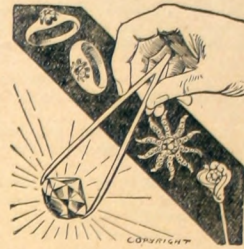
Col. Smith has established headquarters at the La Salle Hotel in Chicago, where the campaign will be managed.

LIVINGSTON COUNTY

NEWS FROM OUR EXCHANGES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY.

There were 697 boys in the reformatory last Saturday, six being received during the week and eight paroled. Of the total number 572 were white and 125 colored.

It is rumored that the Wabash railroad is to put in new passing tracks at the following towns: Wing, Emington, Campus and Reddick. The proposed track at Emington will start south of the depot on the west side of the main track and run south about 5,000 feet.

David A. Funk, at one time a resident of near Odell, died Sunday evening at his home in Streator, death being due to a stroke of paralysis. He is a brother of Mrs. Mary Austin and Arthur Funk, of Odell, and Hon. J. H. Funk, of Iowa, who before his removal to that state was state's attorney of this county and who since his removal to Iowa Falls was elected to the legislature and served as speaker.

Charles F. Black, deputy United States marshal, of Peoria, was in Pontiac Tuesday on business connected with his office. One William Davis, of Danville, who completed his term at the Illinois state reformatory Tuesday, encountered Mr. Black as a reception committee on his release, the deputy having a warrant for his arrest, being indicted for fraudulently using the United States mails. Mr. Black took his prisoner to Peoria Tuesday afternoon, where he will have a hearing before the United States district court.

Frank J. Banker has purchased of Leo V. Daniels the Flanagan Home Times, Mr. Banker assuming charge with the issue of last week. Mr. Daniels has owned the plant for three years. Mr. Banker has lived in Flanagan all his life.

Night Officer Hackley, of Forrest, states that during the past ten days he had harbored seventy-four hoboes in the village lock-up, an average of over seven for each night. Some nights as many as a dozen "Willies" were given lodging. Evidently some of the 125,000 unemployed and hungry soup house patrons are hitting the trail through here.

Martin Kueffner, Sr., of Chatsworth, has divided equally his property, consisting of 400 acres of fine farm land and a residence property in Chatsworth, among his three children, William Kueffner, Charles Kueffner and Mrs. Mary Kratz. The farm land is located partly in Livingston county and partly in Ford county and is divided among the three children, the residence property in Chatsworth going to his daughter, Mrs. Kratz, with whom he has made his home for the past seventeen years.

The sale of the eighty acre farm belonging to the estate of the late Henry W. Benham, deceased, located five and a half miles northeast of Chatsworth, was held in front of the Commercial National Bank last Saturday afternoon by James H. Rodgers, of Gibson City, executor of the estate. Colonel R. R. Baley was the auctioneer and the property sold for \$168 per acre, being purchased by D. A. Klothe, of Piper City. By some the price is considered low, while others who know the conditions consider it a good price.
