TAFT IS CERTAIN OF NOMINATION

Will Have Majority of Delegates From All Sections.

MAY BREAK 1908 RECORD

Progressive Policies Accepted as Surest Avenue of Return of Business Prosperity—Where His Strength Lies in Campaign.

President William H. Taft is on a fair road to renomination as the Republican standard-bearer in the campaign of 1912. With approximately 100 delegates to the Chicago convention already instructed for him the president is more than likely to break his record of 1908 when he was nominated with 702 votes on the first ballot in the Chicago convention of that year.

Coupled with the assurance of his renomination is the growing sentiment in the big Republican states, both east and west, that President Taft is the only Republican candidate who can possibly be elected this fall. It will be recalled readily enough that when Mr. Taft took office three years ago March 4th last, the great issues of tariff revision and reform on a protective basis, and of monetary reform and the great legal problem involved in the exact meaning of the Sherman anti-trust statute, were squarely before the country.

So many bewildering side issues have become involved in the present campaign for delegates to the Chicago convention that the facts above stated have been overlooked in certain communities. Even the progressive achievements of the Taft administration have been forgotten in the excitement occasioned by the introduction of new political doctrines, practically none of which, except the proposal to recall federal judges, can be dealt with by the national government, but must be decided by each state for itself.

The hysteria occasioned by these conditions is now passing away and the foremost fact staring the voters in the face are the progressive and definite policies of President Taft and the certainty of an immediate improvement in business conditions all over the country following his renomination and re-election.

istration, a change in policies and a continuation of business depression and general unrest.

In estimating the probabilities of President Taft's renomination and re-election, it is necessary to recur only to recent history. The president carried every northern state in 1908. Between the election of that year and 1910 occurred the tariff legislation known as the Payne tariff law. It is a well known maxim of politics that that party which revises the tariff is defeated at the next election and the only exception to the rule in recent years was the passage of the Dingley law, which was followed so closely by the outbreak of the Spanish-American war as to bury the tariff issue in a wave of patriotic enthusiasm.

As to the nomination there is no longer the least doubt that President Taft will have a majority of the delegates both from the north and the south. New England will be practically, if not entirely, solid for him. He will have sweeping victories in New York, Pennsylvania and the other middle Atlantic states. Ohio has never yet failed to support a favorite-son candidate for president.

Election.

Polls at primary, April 9, are open from 6 a. m. to 5 p. m. You must state your name, residence and party affiliation. The law requires it.

If challenged, you must file the statutory affidavits before you can vote. See that a judge's initials are on the ballot given you.

Put a cross in the square opposite the name of each candidate (except precinct committeeman) for whom you desire to vote. Put the cross in the square; thus [X]

Under the words, "For Precinct Committeeman" (at bottom of ballot), you may write or paste the name of the person for whom you desire to vote for precinct committeeman. Neither a square nor a cross need be placed opposite the name.

Pastors cannot be used except for precinct committeeman. If you mark three names for representative in the general assembly, your ballot will be counted as 1 vote for each of three candidates; if two names, as 1 1/2 votes for each of two candidates; and if one name, as 3 votes for one candidate.

Official Schedule of Dates.

- April 9.—For the nomination of candidates for state and county offices to be voted for on Nov. 5; advisory vote on United States senator; and for candidates for judicial offices to be voted for on June 3.
STATE AND COUNTY OFFICES.
March 20.—Last day for secretary of state to certify to the county clerk names of candidates for nomination.
March 23.—Last day for candidate to file withdrawal with the county clerk.
April 9.—General state and county primary.
Nov. 5.—General state and county election.
COMMITTEE AND CONVENTION CALENDAR.
April 15.—County convention.
April 17.—Congressional convention.
April 19.—State convention.
May 9.—Last day for state central and senatorial committee to meet for the purpose of organizing.

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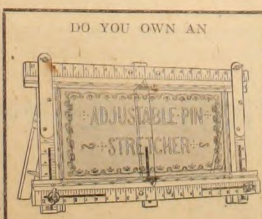
