The streets of Dwight were seas of water Saturday and Sunday and in some cases the cement walks were covered with water, which made it very disagreeable to get around without getting wet feet.

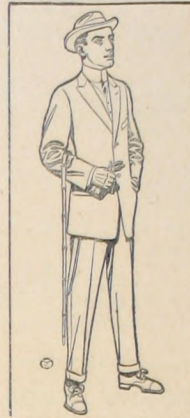
