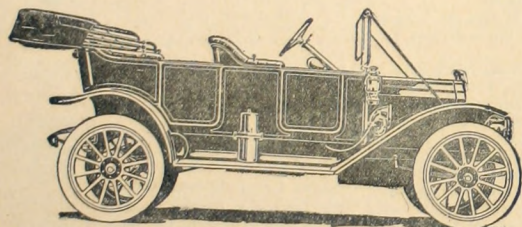

Beginning on April 1, the Chicago, Indiana & Southern railroad will rebalast its entire line from Zearing, Ill., to South Bend, Ind., and from Indiana Harbor to Danville. The rebalast will consist of heavy gravel which will be hauled from Covington, Ind., about ten miles east of Danville. The work will be carried on by work trains out of Danville and Kankakee.

We are indebted to Major C. J. Judd for Havana papers containing interesting accounts of the final sinking of the Maine, and the scenes enacted at the time of the departure of the remains of the victims of the Maine disaster to the United States. They were last week placed in their final resting place in beautiful Arlington cemetery, Washington, D. C.

Prevalence of diphtheria in Illinois during the fall and winter has been so much greater than the expectation that the appropriation for anti-toxin for free distribution has been used up and the state board of health sent out notices Tuesday that as soon as the supply now on hand is exhausted, free distribution will cease. It will then be necessary for physicians to obtain anti-toxin from commercial houses. The free distribution of anti-toxin in Chicago, for which the legislature made a separate appropriation, was suspended January 1. It will be resumed both in Chicago and in the state outside on July 1, when the appropriation for the next fiscal year will be available. Secretary Egan, of the state board, issued on order prohibiting agents from furnishing anti-toxin to any except physicians who have diphtheria patients.
