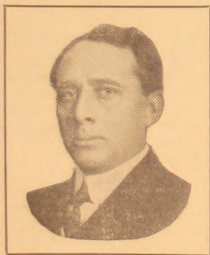

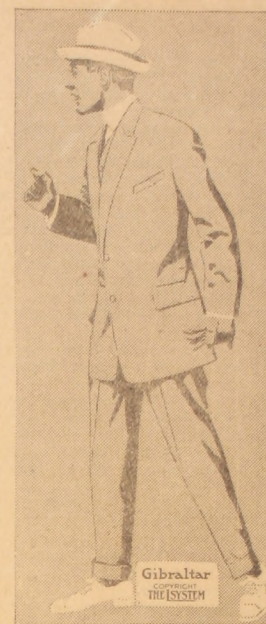
The outfit of the Miller Artesian Well Company arrived here Wednesday and preparations are being made to drill the well for the Keeley Company on their property west of the power house.

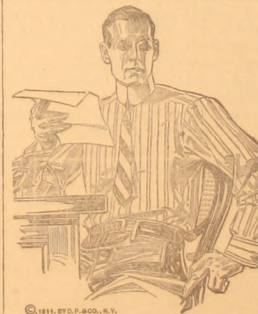
