**Big Meeting in Bloomington.**

Hon. John M. Harlan, nephew of Chief Justice Harlan, and N. W. Bachelard, ex-governor of New Hampshire and ex-master of the National Grange, and Col. Frank L. **Township Election Held Here Tuesday.**

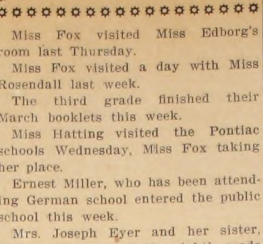
