NEW TELEPHONE SYSTEM.

Central Union Co., To Spend \$25,000 On New Plant in Dwight.

In accordance with the new policy of the Central Union management, the Dwight system is to be replaced with an entirely new one. The improvements, which will take three months to complete, will cost at least \$25,000. Manager Bear, of the local plant, who has become so popular through his work for the betterment of the service, states that Dwight's new plant will be, in point of service, second to none in the country.

"The company's central office will be installed in a new brick building to be erected on Park street by F. L. Smith," said Mr. Bear recently. "It will be 45x30 feet in size, two stories high and of fireproof construction throughout. It will occupy the same site as the present offices. The entire plant is to be replaced with a new one—even to the wires, switch boards and poles. The money to be paid out in wages will be principally distributed in Dwight trade channels and it will amount to considerable. Dwight is a first-class town and our new plant will be a credit to it. The switchboard will be of the very latest type—although we had to spend more money to get it. It will be in seven sections and capable of handling the business for a long time to come. At the present time Foreman Glenn, in charge of the gang, now stringing new toll wires and poles on the Streator-Dwight line, will probably have temporary charge of the construction. Mr. Glenn will complete the toll line work about June 20th. The material for the Dwight work is on the ground and construction will be commenced immediately."—Pontiac Democrat.

Postoffice News.

Postmaster Dustin announces that in addition to the service that has been had through the depot mail box by train No. 6 opening it at 4:20 a. m., last Thursday, the Chief Clerk of the Railway Mail Service issued orders for train No. 5 also to start opening this box.

This gives most admirable service to Dwight, for any mail for Southern points may be dropped in this box up to 11:20 p. m., and get service the same night, and Northern mail may be dropped up to 4:20 a. m., likewise. A new street mail collection box was erected Friday at the junction of East and Chippewa streets. The exact location of the box is on the southwest corner, at the west corner of the Ferguson Motor Sales Garage building. The postoffice will be closed May 30th, Decoration Day, at 10 a. m., for the day. City carriers will make one delivery all over town, starting at 8 a. m. Rural carriers will make no delivery this day.

Former Dwight Boy Left Last Week with Paulist Choristers on Big Trip.

Arthur Breen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Breen, formerly residents of Dwight, but who now reside in Chicago, is one of the Paulist Choristers who left last Wednesday to take part in a musical concourse in Paris and also make European trip.

The following was clipped from the Chicago Record-Herald, of Wednesday, May 15, regarding the same:

"The Paulist Choristers started on their trip to Paris on a special train over the Michigan Central Road at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. They will arrive in Montreal tomorrow afternoon, and in the evening will hold a concert in St. Patrick's, the largest church there. From Montreal the Choristers will go to Quebec, where they are scheduled to leave at 3:30 on Friday afternoon on the steamship Empress of Ireland, Canadian Line. They will arrive in Liverpool Friday, May 24, on which day a concert is scheduled to be held in the Auditorium of Liverpool. Arrangements are being made to give a private concert before the King and Queen of England in Buckingham Palace the following day, Saturday, May 25. On Sunday afternoon, May 26, the Choristers will leave London for Paris, where they will arrive the following morning, on which day the international concert of choral societies representing each country of the world will begin. The Paulist Choristers will spend the week in Paris, taking part in the contest. On Sunday, June 2, the Choristers will sing before the cardinal archbishop of Paris in the Cathedral of Notre Dame at solemn high mass. From Paris they will go to Rome, arriving there June 4, on which afternoon a concert will be given before the Pope. From Rome the Choristers will go to Naples, sailing from there for New York June 5."

Modern Bungalow.

There seems to be a demand for the modern bungalow and that demand has struck Dwight. There are several here, but probably the one which takes the lead is the one recently erected on the Brown property by Mr. Harry Burke, in the east end, and now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Wm. B. Brown. It is a very neat and solidly constructed building and presents a handsome appearance. The walls are of concrete, about four feet, and two feet of pressed brick on top of that. The building is fifty-three feet long, and thirty-three feet wide. The floors are of oak, and the inside finished in oak, with single panel doors. The house has eight rooms, including living, dining and bath rooms, closets and pantry. The dining room is in oak, mission design. The house is heated by a fine hot water system with radiators in every room. It is lighted by electricity with colored lights in dining room.

It is a handsome home and helps to beautify Dwight, and a credit to Mr. Burke and all concerned.
