RAILROAD NEWS

Another sleeper has been added to the Hummer out of Chicago for Kansas City each night. This car goes through to El Paso, Texas. The rush of tourists to California and other points west via El Paso has become so great that a special car was found necessary and will be operated daily until further notice commencing with Sunday night.

Alton agents report unusually heavy passenger business, summer resort travel starting much sooner than last year for some unknown reason. The number of inquiries is much greater than usual while the ticket sales are showing a handsome increase. Tuesday was the bi-weekly homeseekers day and there was a big run of travel to all points south and west. Extra coaches were required to take care of the excess of business. Local passenger travel is also running heavy and the outlook is encouraging for a fine business all through the summer.

The statement of earnings and operating expenses of the Alton for the month of April, carries some items that will create surprise. The decline in earnings of \$192,000 was noted in a preceding issue but the statement of operating expenses, just made public, shows instead of the anticipated decrease, an increase of \$50,411. The road earned during April \$956,243, while the expenses were \$734,111. It was confidently predicted with the suspension of the shops and the economy ordered in maintenance of way and all other departments that a more favorable showing would be made in the way of expenses. It is presumed that much of the heavy expense incurred in March was payable in April and this resulted in the heavy increase. It is thought that the May showing in the way of expenses will indicate a decrease.

Confirmatory of reports in preceding issues that the long expected financing of the Chicago & Alton, had been completed, comes the official announcement to this effect from President T. P. Shonts. The road has sold to New York under riters \$4,500,000 of a new \$20,000,000 issue of six per cent general mortgage gold bonds which will be substituted for the present improvement and equipment mortgage bonds. Ninety days will be required to carry out the details in connection with this issue. The first installment of \$4,500,000 will carry out the present requirements of the company. The money will be utilized for enlargement of Bloomington shops and terminals, overhauling power and equipment, and making various improvements, together with maintenance of way betterments, the overhauling of the track and other new work.
