**RAILROAD NEWS**

Conductor A. B. Corey, the veteran of the Alton Limited, received three broken ribs in the recent mishap to his train south of Shirley. He suffered considerable pain after the occurrence, but did not know until a week after the accident that he had three cracked ribs. He is now in the hands of a surgeon, who will keep him off duty for a month or two.

The transfer of the control of the Chicago and Alton Railroad from the Clover Leaf to the Union Pacific will be made July 18, according to information received from the headquarters of the Union Pacific. It is said that President Shonts will retire. On July 18 the Alton directors will meet in Chicago and elect three members of the Union Pacific directory to succeed three now elected by the Clover Leaf-Shonts interests, and it is reported from New York that Frederick A. Delano, president of the Wash and one of its receivers, will be agreed upon by the reorganized Alton directory for president of the Alton to succeed Mr. Shonts.

That financial matters with the Alton are now easier than for a long time is certain from the activity in various departments. Authority has been granted to purchase seventy-five freight cars to fill vacancies caused by fires and wrecks. Owing to the vast amount of repair work on hand at the Bloomington shops, it is necessary to call upon outside shops to build the cars required. These comprise twenty-six box cars, twenty-six automobile cars, nine refrigerator cars, five flats, four stock, and three furniture. These cars will be built by the contractor making the lowest bid and various car works will be asked to figure upon this work. It is likely that this contract will require a \$75,000 appropriation.

Work upon the overhauling of the Limited train, which was derailed near Shirley some time ago, is going on rapidly and it is planned to have the entire train out of the shops by July 12. The postal car, which was only slightly injured, will be out next week. It has been definitely computed that the expense of rejuvenation will be close of \$5,000, which is not far from the original estimate. Most of the damage was done to the sheathing and much of this must be renewed. Only one sill was broken and this was due to the trucks pressing against the bottom of the car as it turned over. But for the substantial construction of the equipment the damage would have been much greater. A large force is engaged upon the train and it is expected to have all the cars in service again upon the specified time.
