With the coming of the month of June the new hunting licenses for Illinois nimrods went on sale. The old permits expired May 31. The new licenses will expire May 31, 1913, regardless of when issued. The squirrel season opened June 1, and these animals are the only game which may legally be shot this month. It is permissible to kill fifteen per day until November 1. Birds are protected until August 2, when mourning doves may be killed, while all species of water fowl may be killed after Sept. 2. Applications for licenses are few at this season of the year. The rush does not commence until the duck season.
