CHAPTER NO. 191.

Special Appropriation bill for the fiscal year ending April 15th, 1913.

Be it ordained by the President and Members of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Dwight, Illinois:

Section I.—That for all the necessary expenses and liabilities of said Village of Dwight, Illinois, for the fiscal year ending April 15th, 1913, there be an appropriation of the sum of Fifteen Thousand One Hundred Ten and Ninety-Six Cents (\$15,110.96) Dollars, in detail for the following purposes, namely:

Ball games like this are sure to bring good crowds and the park at Cabery should be packed July 7th, when the Smiths play the return game. Frank Flood's two-bagger hit in the ninth aroused the hopes of the fans but the best Burns could do was a slow one to J. Naas, who tossed the ball to J. Miller for the third out.

Obituary of Thos. W. Kelly.

Thos. W. Kelly, who has been sick for the last eight months, passed away June 15, 1912, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. F. Super, where he was taken after his own home had been destroyed by the cyclone which swept through here April 21.

He was 84 years old but bore his sufferings very patiently, never complaining, and when the end came he was well prepared to meet his Maker, having been strengthened with the Holy Sacraments of his church, of which he was a faithful member.

The funeral was held at St. Patrick's Church, Tuesday, June 18, at ten o'clock and was largely attended. Solemn Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Power, assisted by Father Cannon, of Pontiac, and Father Keren, of Sunbury, after which the remains were laid to rest in the Catholic cemetery.
