John Lucian Young is Dead.

John L. Young, one of the well known residents of Pontiac, died Sunday morning, July 14, at his home, 303 East Madison street, death being due to pernicious anaemia. The funeral was held Tuesday, July 16, at 1:30 p. m., Rev. W. T. Paulin, pastor of the First Baptist Church, conducting. The funeral services were in charge of Crescent Lodge, No. 118, Knights of Pythias, of which the deceased was a member.

John Lucian Young was born in Pontiac, Ill., October 22, 1867, his birth occurring in the residence in which his death occurred. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lucian Young, well known pioneer residents of this city. He spent all of his life in this city. He attended the public schools as much as his health would permit, he having been in ill health since early childhood. At the death of his father a number of years ago he assumed the management of his harness shop, which he conducted until his health compelled him to dispose of it.

He was united in marriage October 24, 1900, to Miss Mabel Johnson, of Dwight, who, with a son, Lucian, remain to mourn his death. He was a member of Crescent Lodge, No. 118, Knights of Pythias, of this city, and in such always took an active interest. He was a man who was highly respected by those who knew him. He was possessed of a kindly and jovial spirit which made him a host of friends, who will mourn with the widow and son over his death.

For the past fourteen months Mr. Young has been practically confined to his home with the disease which caused his death. For the past four weeks he has been confined to his bed most all of the time, his death occurring as stated.—Leader.
