Major Judd, who has been for the past two weeks fishing at Tomahawk Lake and who has met with good success in the way of wall-eyed pike, bass and perch, succeeded on July 29th in landing an eighteen pound muskellunge. While going from one part of the lake to another to get a new location, a line was trolled and the fish was hooked. It took forty-five minutes to land him and this was accomplished with a light bass line. It was necessary to row for deep water and row in a circle in order to avoid snapping the line and adding the fish to the large number of enormous ones that had escaped. The fish measures three feet in length. This is the largest muskellunge which has been caught in Tomahawk Lake this season. When the fish was received by Mr. Barry he took pains to take it down the street and exhibit it; among other places he brought it to the office of the STAR and HERALD, but so far as we have been able to learn he did not leave it anywhere.

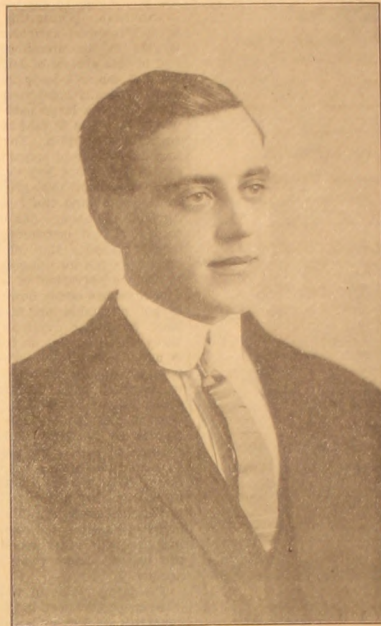
