Frank L. Smiths Win from K. C. Defenders at West Side Park.
After suffering two defeats at the hands of the boys from Cabery the Smiths turned the tables on them Sunday and with Mickelson pitching shut out ball and Sam Lannon, Boyer, F. Flood and Gutel doing the heavy stick work, scored three runs in the sixth inning, winning the game.

In the first inning J. Lannon was out, D. Miller to J. Miller. Sam Lannon doubled to center; Frank Flood hit one that looked good for a single but some fast fielding by Brownie Naas nipped Sam Lannon at third. Neither team threatened until the sixth. J. Lannon was out, Naas to Miller. Sam Lannon singled; Flood singled, Lannon going to third, and Flood taking second on the play at third. The Cabery boys objected strenuously to decision of Watts at third but resumed play and in an attempt to pass Boyer, C. Adams threw one so wide the catcher couldn't get it and Lannon scored from third. Brown, the Cabery catcher, threw the ball over C. Adams and Flood scored. Right here is where Brownie Naas gave the spectators an exhibition of long distance throwing. He threw the ball over center field fence almost to the street and ran off the field, calling the rest of the players. After a few minutes arguing, play was resumed and Boyer hit one to center for two sacks; Gutel followed with another two bagger, scoring Boyer. Burns hit to J. Miller for the second out, Gutel going to third, and C. Adams threw Paderni out at first ending the inning. In the seventh inning a horse hitched to a single buggy broke loose and ran clear around the grounds, causing lots of excitement. Spectators rushed out and flagged him and just before he crossed the home plate Frank Flood succeeded in grabbing him by the bridle and thus the only home run of the game was averted by a narrow margin.

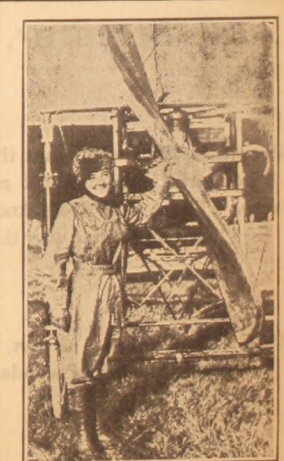
