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

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CITY SCHOOLS OPEN ON NEXT TUESDAY.
East Side School House Redecorated, Thoroughly Cleaned and Everything in Fine Shape.
The city schools will open on Tuesday, September 3, and the school children will again gather their books under their arms and be sent on their way to school. The smiling faces of the teachers will again be seen, many of whom live here, and others who come highly recommended from different cities.

During the summer months the school buildings have been thoroughly renovated and they will be fresh and clean for the pupils who will occupy them during the ensuing nine months. In the East side school the second story hall and stairways leading to the gymnasium have been furnished with steel ceilings which now makes the entire ceilings of the interior covered with steel. The walls and ceilings of the halls and a few of the rooms have also been given a coat of paint and a number of the desks have been revarnished. A cement floor has been put in the boys' play room which will take the place of the brick one which was formerly there. This not only improves the looks but makes it easier to be kept clean.

An entire change of wiring and bells will also be put in and will be attached to a large clock which will be placed in the lower hall way. The bells will be rung automatically in the interior of the building during the day for the different classes and for calling and dismissing school. The entire system of bells will be rung by the clock except the gong on the outside of the building which will be operated by the janitor.

Mr. C. A. Brothers, of Joliet, has been engaged to superintend the schools this year and needs no recommendation or words of praise as he was principal here last year, and not only showed that he was capable of holding his position as principal but made many friends in town and among the school children while doing so.

Mr. G. W. Fredrick, who had been engaged as principal for the coming year, resigned last week and although three or four more teachers have been heard from to fill the position no one has as yet been decided on by the Board.

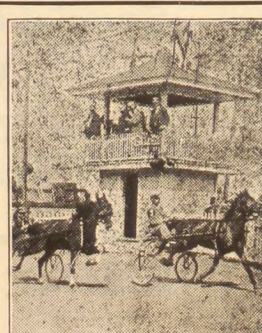
