## Reduction in Cost of Residence Lighting

BEGINNING SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 1, 1912

this Company will offer to its residence customers the privilege of using its service for lighting at the maximum demand rate.

Under this system, electricity used for residence lighting will be fourteen and one-half cents (14 $\frac{1}{2}$ c) per kilowatt hour for the first thirty hours use of the maximum number of kilowatt hours taken at any one time during the month. The rate charged for all remaining kilowatt hours will be eight cents (8c).

A discount for prompt payment of one cent per kilowatt hour on the customer's total consumption of electricity will be allowed by the Company on all bills paid at the proper office or agency within ten (10) days after their dates by him.

Customers having installations of less than five kilowatts (that is less than 100 lamps of fifty watts each) will have their maximum demand determined by fixed percentage of their installation.

This rate will effect an average reduction in residential lighting bill of fifteen per cent.
