### DORMAN-BALBACH.

Former Dwight Boy Married in Chenoa Wednesday.

Mr. Adrian Vance Dorman, a former Dwight boy and son of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Dorman, of this city, was married to Miss Anna May Balbach, the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Balbach, of Chenoa, Wednesday, at 1:30 p. m., at the Presbyterian Church in Chenoa. The following was clipped from the Pantagraph, of Bloomington:

"The marriage of Mr. Adrian Vance Dorman and Miss Anna May Balbach took place Wednesday at 1:30 p. m. at the Presbyterian church, Rev. E. F. Hoke officiating in the presence of about 200 guests. Mrs. Austin Harrington, of Fairbury, presided at the organ and rendered the Lohengrin wedding march as the bridal party entered the church and took their places before the altar where Rev. Mr. Hoke spoke the words uniting them in marriage. The ring service was used and the bride was given away by her father. The couple were attended by Miss Isaranda Sanborn, of Proctor, Vermont, as maid of honor, and Nyle Jacob Balbach, brother of the bride as best man. The bridesmaids were Misses Josephine Hedge and Mildred Boyd, of Chenoa; Miss Hazel Thompson, of Dixon, and Miss Lillian Warner, of Bloomington, and the ushers were Clarence Churchill, of Chenoa; Joseph Bear, of Piper City; E. W. Warner of Bloomington, and Luther Hahn, of Dwight. Kathryn Ellfrink and Eloise Thompson were the over girls.

"The bride is the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Balbach, of Chenoa. She is a graduate of the Chenoa high school and spent two years at Oberlin College and is a talented and accomplished young lady. The groom is a son of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Dorman, of Dwight. He has resided in Chenoa for some time and up to July 1, this year, was associated with Harrison Brothers in the grain business, but at that time he sold his interest in the grain business and a short time ago bought a half interest in his wife's father's grocery store. Following the ceremony the guests went to the home of the bride where an elaborate luncheon was served on the lawn. The couple departed on the evening train for Chicago and from there will go to Lac Vieux Desert, Wis., on their wedding trip."

### Former Minister of Lutheran Church Near this City Burned to Death in Automobile Wreck in Iowa.

Word was received here this week of the terrible death of Rev. H. Grefe, pastor of the Lutheran Church in Germantown, Iowa, who was burned to death last Friday night before the eyes of his children and several other persons while pinned beneath a wrecked motor car.

The car was driven by August Pauling, of Germantown, and in it were the children of both Rev. H. Grefe and Mr. Pauling. When about six miles from Paulina the steering gear of the machine refused to work and the automobile jumped from a small bridge and turned over. Rev. H. Grefe was pinned beneath the wreck and the children were thrown a distance away from the machine. Mr. Pauling was injured and died at noon last Saturday.

The cries of the children were heard by persons living in the neighborhood who immediately rushed to the scene of the accident. One of them carried a lantern with him and while trying to get Rev. Grefe from underneath the wreckage, dropped it. Instantly the wreckage was ignited into flames as the gasoline from the oil tank had spread over the wrecked machine.

The rescuers then made frantic efforts to aid Rev. Grefe but were driven back by the flames in the attempt to raise the burning machine from his body and he went to his death with prayers on his lips.

Rev. H. Grefe was well known in this locality, having preached at the Lutheran Church in the German settlement six miles north of this city about three years ago. He made many friends while here who were greatly grieved to learn of his horrible death.

The week closes with a notable fall in the temperature and the first cloudy day of the month.
