CHAPTER NO. 197.
Be it ordained by the President and Members of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Dwight, County of Livingston, and State of Illinois.
Section I. That a tax be levied on all property subject to taxation within the said Village of Dwight, County of Livingston and State of Illinois, as the same was assessed and equalized for the current year, sufficient in amount to pay the revenue for said Village in the sum of Nine Thousand, Five Hundred Two and Nine-Tenths Dollars (\$9502.92).
Section II. Said tax so levied is hereby appropriated for the following purposes and uses respectively:

Clerk's Salary 125.00
Compensation Trustees 325.00
Police 1000.00
Electric Light 3000.00
Bonds 1005.00
Interest on Bonds 452.92
Park Tax Special 500.00
Sewer 500.00

Total \$9502.92
