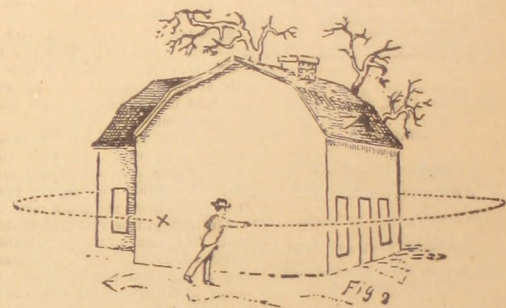

The Brist Boomerang can be thrown through the air in a horizontal line, making a perfect curve or circle of from thirty to one hundred feet in diameter, according to size and weight of Boomerang, returning with complete accuracy to thrower.
