Report of County Farm Committee.

The following report of the Committee on County House and Farm, to which was attached the semi-annual report of Clay D. Parker, superintendent, was adopted on motion of Mr. Thomas:

State of Illinois, Livingston county, ss. Board of Supervisors, September term, September 13, 1912.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen of the Board of Supervisors:

Your Committee on County House and Farm would beg leave to submit the following report to which is attached the semi-annual report of Superintendent Clay D. Parker. Your committee would respectfully report that they met at the court house in Pontiac on June 28 and let contract for decorating and surgery at the county house to Dr. Ross for two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) per year. On July 3 we met at the court house in Pontiac and received the bids for building barn and silo at the county farm. After examining the bids we let the contract to Hal Opperman, of Pontiac, his bid being the lowest, for the sum of \$3,926. We also met with the commissioners of highways of Edwards Point township on the same date and let contract for ditches which gives the county farm an outlet for all their tile, for the sum of eleven hundred and sixty dollars (\$1,160), five hundred and eighty dollars of which was paid on August 15. The remainder being due on the comple-

tion of the ditch. On September 6 we met at the county farm and found the inmates, farm and stock in satisfactory condition to your committee.
