Obituary of Mrs. John F. Hansen.
 Martha Hansine Klitz was born in Brons, North Slesvig, Denmark, December 25, 1831, and was married to Mr. John P. Hansen April 12, 1863. To this union were born three children, two of which are living, namely, Mr. Hans J. Hansen, and Mrs. Frank Frandsen. The other child died in infancy.

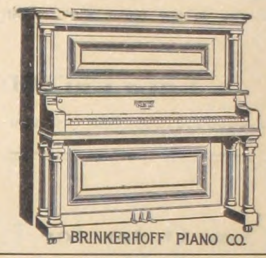
We have four gold watches that we shall give to the contestants or to persons who are not contestants. They will be given during the next sixteen weeks in the following way:
