NEWS FROM OUR EXCHANGES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY.

Ira Greider, of Pontiac, was adjudged insane in the county court Tuesday morning and was taken to the state hospital at Bartonville for treatment.

A rope used to hoist a wheelbarrow of cement at Mazon broke. The barrow fell, struck the end of a scaffold and flipped William Bowes, of Odell, twenty-five feet to the ground, seriously injuring him.

The congregation of the First Methodist Episcopal Church of Pontiac has arranged for a big revival service which is to open at that church November 17. Dr. E. L. Eaton, of Evanston, accompanied by his singer, will conduct the meetings, which are to continue indefinitely.

Announcement has just been made of the marriage of Miss Eva Bazel Smith, of Gardner, to Grover T. Morehart, the wedding having occurred October 13 at the home of the bride's parents. Mr. Morehart was born and raised at Saunemin but has resided for several years at Aberdeen, S. D.

The supreme court Monday denied the petition of the Strawn Farmers' Elevator company for a writ of certiorari to appeal from the appellate court for the second district, the case of Bennett & Co. vs. The Strawn Farmers' Elevator Company. The case was originally in the circuit court of Livingston county.

Mrs. Joseph Gross, of 924 East Howard street, Pontiac, who has been sick for some time past, wandered away from home Sunday afternoon. For seven hours members of her family and friends and neighbors searched for her, and at 11 o'clock Sunday night she was found rolling in a ditch along the Illinois Central tracks on the north side of the city. She was returned to her home, where she was reported Monday afternoon as being in a critical condition.

Miss Nina O. Kellar, of Fairbury, and Mr. Delbert J. Damon, of Rockford, Ill., were married by Rev. John H. Boose, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Pontiac, Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. They were accompanied by Miss Bertha Hueni and Mr. Joseph Kellar, a brother of the bride. Mrs. Damon is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Emil Kellar, of Fairbury, and is quite popular in that place. Mr. Damon is manager of the Majestic theatre in Rockford, where they will make their home.

John Thorne, who has made his home at Swygert for a number of years, died at the family home there last Saturday evening. The funeral was held from the Swygert church on Tuesday afternoon, October 22, at 2 o'clock, Rev. George E. Young, rector of Grace Episcopal Church in Pontiac, conducting the services. Mr. Thorne was born in England, September 14, 1861. He spent all of his early life there, coming to the United States in later years and has resided at Swygert for a number of years. He leaves by his death a wife, five boys and three girls.

Deputy Sheriff J. R. Ives returned Monday night from Peoria, bringing with him Morris Goodwill, who at one time was conductor on the Toledo, Peoria and Western Railroad, and placed him in the Livingston county jail. Goodwill was indicted by the recent grand jury on the charge of larceny, it being charged he stole some goods from the property of the railroad company at Forrest. Since leaving the employ of the railroad company Goodwill had been employed as night marshal of Averyville and when arrested by request of Sheriff W. A. Patterson was employed in the Kingman factory at Averyville. When the officer and his prisoner arrived at the Goodwill home after his arrest the prisoner never said a word to his wife of where he was going or informed her he was in trouble. When the wife asked the husband when he expected to return he said he did not know—probably in ten days. The sheriff then told the wife where her husband was going and what he was wanted for. The grief stricken woman and her two children were left at the home and the prisoner was whisked away in the automobile to the county jail and later taken to Pontiac.

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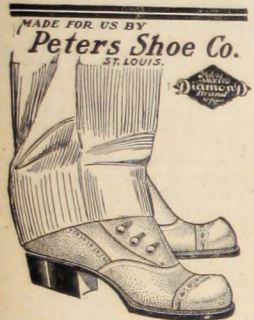
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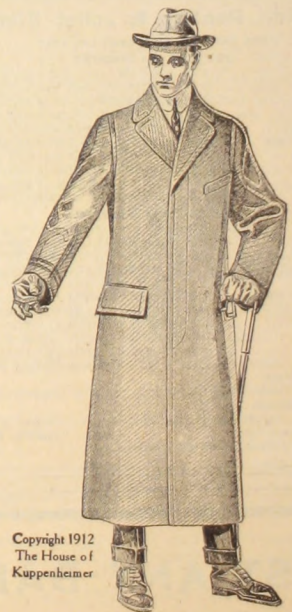
