He was a kind and loving husband, good neighbor and will be missed by all.

He leaves to mourn his loss a wife, daughter and grandson. The funeral services were held Monday morning at 10 o'clock at St. Patrick's Catholic Church, Rev. J. F. Powers officiating. Burial was made in the Catholic cemetery.

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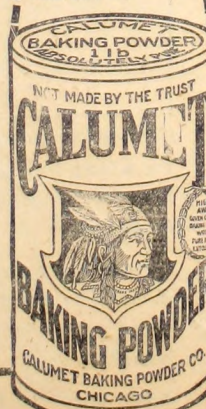

used in Mazon as well as in Morris. That the same contractor will do the same work in Mazon for the same money as he would in Morris. The county property in Morris is worth its face value any time. This property the county will sell, and its valuation will go far on the new property in Mazon. For the extra money needed Mazon will give liberally.

Don't listen to that feeble argument that Mazon will have no sewerage, no water works, no gravel roads. There were years when Morris had neither, yet they had the court house. Besides Mazon will have these things. Another thing Mazon will no sooner be the county seat than there will be an interurban line crossing our county north and south, which will be of untold value all along the line.

Now a word to the neighboring towns. Some are entertaining the idea that if Mazon gets the court house it will hurt them. Good, sound judgment should teach you differently. If you will only think for yourself you can't name an instance where it will hurt you. Mazon will keep her trade and the farmers who have stood so loyally by you in the past will continue to do so. Your only danger can be in voting against the farmers' interest in this matter for a motive of jealousy or selfishness. If you did this then they would certainly spot your town for all time to come and you can undoubtedly see they would be justified in so doing.

Now, Mr. Voter, it is time for you to wake up and be a true American. This high tax cry is rot. And next Tuesday morning ask yourselves these questions. Then vote honestly.

DEATH OF PETER EPPLER.

Husband of Former Resident of this City Dies in Pontiac Sunday Evening.

The following was clipped from the Pontiac Leader:

Dr. Peter Eppler died at his home, 104 West Reynolds street, Sunday evening, after a brief illness, but following a period of poor health extending over several years.

The funeral will be held Wednesday morning, November 6, at 10 o'clock, from the First Lutheran Church, this city, conducted by Rev. C. F. Martins, of Madison, Wis., assisted by Rev. Mr. Richter, of Rugby. Preceding the services at the church a short service will be held at the home, commencing at 9:30 o'clock. The remains will be buried in the family lot at Chenoa.

Peter Eppler was born in Wirttemberg, Germany, August 29, 1840. He came to this country with his parents, to Chicago, in 1852, where he lived until 1867, receiving in the city schools a common school education and also attending Bryant & Stratton's business college there. In 1864 he entered the Chicago Medical college, graduating from that institution in 1867. Following his course there he became an interne at Mercy Hospital, where he served for three years. He then came to Livingston county, locating in Pontiac and forming a partnership with Dr. Filkins. He remained here eight months and then went to Cayuga, where he remained for thirty-seven years, building up a large practice in medicine. On account of advancing years and failing health he retired from practice and four years ago returned to Pontiac and bought the home at 104 West Reynolds street, where he has since resided.

Dr. Eppler was married on Easter Monday, 1872, to Miss Augusta Schliepsiek, of Dwight, Ill. To this union were born eleven children, two of whom died in infancy. The remaining children with the wife, survive. The children are: Mrs. W. P. Riedel, of Buffalo, N. Y.; Mrs. V. Walthers, Racine, Minn.; Mrs. John Gutz, Pomeroy, Ia.; John Eppler, of Fairmount, N. D.; Benjamin Eppler, of Deisen, N. D.; Hulda, Ruth, Eula and Carl, at home.

Prevailing weather conditions for the month of October, 1912, were generally of an excellent quality. The mean temperature, 55.2 degrees, was 2.6 degrees above normal and 2.8 degrees warmer than October one year ago. The maximum, 87 degrees, was recorded on the 6th; the minimum, 25 degrees, on the 24th. The total rainfall, 3.17 of an inch, was 1.27 above normal. Deficiency since January 1st, 1.84. There was 19 clear, bright, sunny days, 4 partly cloudy and 8 cloudy; but one thunderstorm occurred during the month. The mean temperature for the week, 41.8 degrees, was 2.5 degrees above normal, and 3.8 degrees warmer than the corresponding week, 1911. Generally cloudy with excessive rains has prevailed, but one clear day noted. Unsettled conditions mark the close of the week.
